The term derives from the humoral medicine of the ancient Greeks, Which taught that the balance of fluids in the human body known as humors, controlled human health and emotion. People of all ages, cultures and natures always respond to humour. Young children are mostly in favour of slapstick (Physical comedy) such as Punch and Judy puppet shows or cartoons such as Tom and Jerry, whose physical nature makes it accessible to them. On the contrary, more sophisticated forms of humour such as satire require an understanding of its social meaning and context. Therefore it tends to appeal to the mature audience.

Its purpose is to break the monotony, boredom and tediousness and make the audience's nerve relaxed. Eighteenth century German author George Lichtenberg said that humour creates a positive and informal environment that triggers reader's enthusiasm and interest.
- 2) **To overcome worries, anxieties and fears:** In the childhood, many children suffer from anxieties, worries and fears. Separation anxiety which is closely related to loneliness and isolation is an important anxiety within the very young readership. Children feel alone, not only by their parents and family but also by friends. From time

to time, they also feel lonely and isolated. So through children books, children can remove their problem because books are the only medium to accompany them forever. Humour has a healing power to reduce tensions. Humour helps children to engage with stories and the language so that they will forget their loneliness and anxiety.

- 3) **To develop language speak ability and readability:** Children love fun and laughter, the surprising, the unexpected and the outrageous. But rhymes, jokes, verse and songs are more than just enjoyable, they teach about language and demonstrate the wonder of word play. This is surely one of the foundations of good writing and is a great way to encourage children to become passionate readers.
- 4) **To entertain the children with fantasy and magic:** The first and the foremost intention of humour are to make the children laugh. Through the different types of humour, writer wants to entertain the children more and children enjoy the books a lot. Humour in children's Literature is a specific literature genre and an element, tool or key for making things better.

In general humour is often used to make light of difficult or stressful situations and to brighten up social atmosphere. It is regarded by many as an enjoyable and positive experience, so it would be reasonable to assume that humour might have some positive psychological effects on the body.

Conclusion: Humour in literature does not function as humour for its own sake only, but especially in literature it has a lifetime purpose i.e. to relieve childhood's anxieties, worries and fears and support in this way children's well-being. Children identify with literature protagonists, who face common worries, anxieties and fears, laugh, enjoy and learn throughout reading and experience hero's problematic situations with less stress and more joy, learning in such ways to face their own worries with less stress, anxiety and fear.
